Fruit Stuffed Pork Loin

3 pound boneless pork loin roast, butterflied*

2/3 cup dried apricots, chopped

2/3 cup dried prunes, chopped

2/3 to 1 cup fresh cranberries

Garlic chopped

Dried thyme

Salt, coarse

Pepper

Open roast. Mix and spread fruit and garlic inside roast; tie up.

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Sprinkle coarse salt, pepper and fresh or dried thyme over outside of meat. Place in a shallow roasting pan; bake until meat thermometer inserted into center reads 160 degrees. Check temperature after one hour. May take a bit longer.

* Have meat butterfied at the market. Ask for string to tie roast after stuffing.

I found a couple interesting Christmas articles I will share here with you.

The Masquerade: The old Atlantic quadrille club held their annual masquerade ball last night at Bacon's opera house. Forty-three couples were present and participated, while nearly 100 spectators were in the gallery. A great number of the dancers wore elegant costumes, and disguises were so complete that nobody knew anybody. There were princes, princesses, kings, Indians, squaws and other characters almost without number. M'Liss. Topsy, Floure Girl, Jinks and his babies, I and aunt Ophelia, Santa Claus, the horse-woman, and a great number of other characters were well taken. The Esquimaux were much noticed with their snow white suits. It was really a grand sight to watch the gay dancers in their varied and curious costumes, and we cannot recollect onetwentieth of the different characters represented.

As a fitting end to the most busy year the Telegraph office ever experienced, the entire force, from head pushers down to the boys who fold the papers gathered at the Park Hotel last night and ate as guests of the office. Covers were laid for thirty. there being that many persons in the employ of the Telegraph office. including the wives.

Landlord Elliott severd a fine repast which would do credit to a much more pretentious hostelry than his, and it was appliedated by every one who sat at the tables. A few toasts at the conclusion of the feast were not less happy than the eating, and the company then adjourned to the parlors where games and music were enjoyed until time for going home.
