



Advance Information

IT has just been announced that the Grand Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held in Chattanooga, Tennessee in September 1913. What wonderful memories this announcement brings back to the minds of those who participated in the various battles and campaigns of our Civil War.

To many of the Veterans this coming encampment will be the first opportunity of again revisiting and this time enjoying, the scenes of half a century ago, for this is the first time that the Grand Encampment has ever been held in the far South.

And no more famous or historical spot could have been chosen for the Grand Encampment for within a narrow radius of Chattanooga were fought some of the fiercest battles this world has ever seen; the battle of Chickamauga commencing on the 18th of September 1863, lasting for three days and in which 26,000 men were killed or wounded in both armies; the "Battle above the Clouds" that lasted all during the day and night of November 24 and the battle of Missionary Ridge the following day, the Federal forces under Grant defeating the Confederates under Bragg with a combined loss of 12,000 men, killed, wounded and missing.

Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park embracing over fifteen square miles will be of great interest, as will be the present modern Army post and Lookout Mountain, 2200 feet above sea level from whose summit can be obtained one of the grandest views on this continent.

And enroute to this Encampment bear in mind that the Louisville & Nashville R. R. and the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Ry. afford the best service and by far the most attractive route. For years these lines have been known as the "Battle Fields Route" because of the fact they pass through or near the majority of the Southern battlefields and if you insist upon your ticket reading from either St. Louis, Evansville, Louisville or Cincinnati over the Louisville & Nashville R. R. to Nashville and the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Ry. to Chattanooga you will be assured of seeing more of interest than you can by any other possible route.

Between Cincinnati and Nashville a glimpse of the battlefield at Munfordsville, Ky., can be had from the car window and on either the going or return trip a stopover can be secured without additional cost at Glasgow Junction, Ky., to visit Mammoth Cave. Just north of Nashville the line passes through the National Cemetery where the remains of over 30,000 Federal soldiers are buried.

The portion of the line from Louisville to Nashville was in service during the war and was the only means of conveyance by rail for troops and supplies of the Federal forces into Tennessee.

Coming through Chicago or St. Louis the line crosses the Ohio River at Evansville, Ind., and thence to Nashville. No matter through which of our Northern gateways you come the route will take you via Nashville. And this city will be of interest to the G. A. R. Veteran and arrangements should be made to spend a day here on the return trip. Nashville has played an important part in the history of our country. It has furnished two presidents, Jackson and Polk and was a storm center in the early days of the Republic. Here was fought on December 15 and 16, 1864, the most important battle west of Chattanooga with the exception of the battle of Stones River, Federal troops consisting of 55,000 men and the Confederate army about 25,000 men. The loss during the two days engagement was nearly 10,000 men. General Grant made Nashville his headquarters while acting as commander-in-chief of the Army of the Cumberland.

A short distance south of Nashville on the Louisville & Nashville R. R. was fought the battle of Franklin, November 30, 1864, the fiercest, bloodiest and most

signal battle of the entire war. More generals were killed in this six hours struggle than were killed in the two days fight at Chickamauga, or the three days battle at Gettysburg.

It will be a memorable encampment and from present indications the most largely attended of any other Grand Encampment for years back. It should be particularly attractive to the daughters and sons of Veterans who will have the privilege of going over the various battlefields in company with those whose lines are now rapidly thinning out, but who helped make history with that remarkable Army.

Rates

As yet reduced rates to Chattanooga have not been named but a special low rate will be authorized from all points for this encampment and just as soon as the rates are named prompt notice will be given the Veterans and the public.

On the following page will be found our present train schedules between Chicago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Louisville and Evansville to Chattanooga. For the G. A. R. Grand Encampment additional equipment will be placed on all trains and Special G. A. R. trains operated wherever necessary from any of the above gateways. Everything will be done to give the Veterans and their friends an enjoyable, safe and comfortable trip over the "Battlefields Route."
