#### ANNUAL REPORT - 1988

We started the year of 1988 by reviewing our by-laws. This is required so that we may bring them up-to-date and make any changes that are necessary. February and March were used to plan projects for the year. Suggestions were made as to what types of programs the membership wanted. Many society members helped in this search. In May the first section of the 1860 Davis County, Iowa, Federal Census was sent to I.G.S. for profit-sharing publication. This project was done by Peggy and Verle Arnold. All four sections are completed and available to purchase.

June and July were devoted to plannings and actual doing the fair booth at the county fair. In June the society ordered several books to be given to the Bloomfield Public Library to increase their genealogy collection. It is through their kindness that we have a library room of our own and a place to hold our meetings. I felt that we would like to take this method to repay their kindness. In July the county fair gave us the chance to meet people and promote our society. We gave a free membership to Eva Tews from a drawing held. We also used this opportunity to get a list of people who would be interested in taking Beginning Genealogy classes. Several people signed up and the society felt the booth was worth the effort.

In August Loren Horton presented a program on cemeteries and grave markers in the United States. The society invited other genealogy societies in the area to attend. # Land Records Of By E. Kay Kirkham

It is a known fact in genealogical research that no one source of information will make a complete record. It is true also that of the many records in the United States that have genealogical value, each contributes its own value to the completed record. The value that records do contribute in genealogy will vary from one record to another and from one period of time to another. No one record should be ignored because of its limited value; no one record should be accepted as being a complete record without giving other records a chance to do their part. Land records in America, as such, do not solve all problems in genealogical research but they do contribute to the completeness of the accepted record. Perhaps too, the records made and arising from the sale and purchase of land will offer information that would not be found in any other record or any other place.

The migrations of American people from the earliest settlement until 1990 caused families to leave behind a minimum of records, especially vital records. Information about the birth and death, as well as marriage of family members, was left all along the line of travel. Vital records were not required by law on the American frontier. Births were recorded in the family Bible and marriages were recorded there too as well as with the traveling minister but many deaths were recorded only at the roadside.

Many of the early settlers were farmers, and the land records that they made, if they did nothing else, gave an estimated time of their arrival and departure from any given area. But land records do more than that as a rule and there are different kinds of land records.

There will be times when the information from land records will not be needed to enhance your genealogical history or record. Then on the other hand, the alert researcher will watch, for example, for the ancestor who dies intestate (without leaving a last will and testament) and has his land holdings distributed to his heirs by a so-called deed of partition, with its valuable family information. Being sware of the added contribution that just this one land record can make as a contribution to the family history is a decided advantage to the successful researcher and writer.

It is a truism in genealogical research that no one record can be isolated. This being true of all records of genealogical value, we should then look for land records of genealogical value following the death of the head of the family and the settlement of his estate. Deeds of gift to children often precede, by a few months or years, the death of a testator. Deeds of gift to the prospective bride are not unusual at or before the time of marriage.

In all genealogical research watch for the unusual event. The unusual, often enough, will make it worthwhile to investigate the event and examine the

records that are made because of it. Examples of the unusual are contests in court for land ownership, hearings by land com-missioners, the sudden death of an individual or of an entire family, a massacre, a murder, etc. Court minutes, articles in the newspapers and obituary notices may reveal information about a family or an individual that might otherwise never be mentioned in a family Bible, a diary or a life sketch of a member of the family

Finally, land is real property and its sale and purchase is a very formal thing before the law. As your research problem becomes more difficult, sooner or later, you will be compelled to consider the contribution that land records can make to

the eventual solution.---

## COUNCIL AGREES TO PAY FOR DAMAGE TO STONES

The Centerville City Council Monday night agreed to pay for damage done in the City Cemetery to gravestones of the Dot Husted family. The damage was apparently caused by a lawn mower used to mow the grass at the facility.

Mrs. Husted appeared before the council, requesting that the city pay the expenses she accrued in repairing the two damaged stones. Husted paid \$710 plus tax to Winterset Monument Co. to repair chips in the bases of the stones. In addition, she must pay \$35 for resetting the

Mayor I.. Jay Johnson informed the council that both representatives at Winterset and Wayne Frericks, owner of Centerville Monument Co., had confirmed that the damage appeared to have been done by a lawn mower.

"If the city is at fault, we need to do something to correct it," councilman Tim Vidas said. Councilman John Curtis agreed, making a motion that the city pay for the \$710 bill plus the \$35 bill, while attempting to forego taxes on the bills as the city is not required to pay sales taxes.

DETERMINE CHURCH AFFILIATION OF ANCESTOR Mower County Genealogy News, Vol. 1, #19

In determining the church affiliation of your ancestor, these clues could be considered: NATIONAL ORIGIN If your ancestors were Scotch-Irish, chances are they were Presbyterian or Quaker. Most of the Irish were Catholic. usual rule, English people were members of the Church of England, Congregationalists, or Methodists. Many of the German nationality were members of either the the Lutheran or the German Reformed and Evangelical churches, Most Swedish belonged to the Lutheran Church. The Dutch were affiliated with the Dutch Reformed Church. Many of the Swiss were Mennonites, some coming from Germany where they had gone because of the religious persecution in their country. Other clues to be considered are: family traditions which point to a definite religion; tombstones (the "sign" of the Methodists was the upraised hand with the index finger pointing to heaven); wills, death certificates, hospital records, obituaries. Once you have decided the religion to which your ancestor belonged, write to the church located in the area or city where he lived. for copies of any records pertaining to the family you are interested in. THE GREAT MIGRATION FROM THE AMERICAN COLONIES TO CANADA. How many are aware of the great migration to Canada from Pennsylvania, Maryland, New York, New Jersey, Vermont, etc? Many thousands of immigrants from the American Colonies went to Canada, especially to Ontario, during the years 1776 to 1850. Although some went before 1776 "The First Great Migration" took place from 1776 to 1812. The migrations from Pennsylvania were mostly from the counties of Lancaster, Bucks, Somerset, Montgomery and Northampton. Many from New York were from Dutchess County, Long Island, Mohawk Valley and Albany. The reason that many of these families went to Canada rather than join the Ohio migration was because they had sworn loyalty to the English king; to escape persecution and also to be free from war service. The latter applied especially to the "Plain Folks". Many of these groups who went to Canada were the Moravians, Lutherans, Reformed, Huguenots, Mennonites, Amish, Quakers and Dunkards. The names of these families are ones very common in Ohio and Pennsylvania and these other states today. Here in the trackless wilderness they found rich limestone soil and walnut trees. the sign of rich soil. One of the most valuable and highly recommended books on research of these families is "The TRAIL OF THE BLACK WALNUT" by G. Elmore Rebman. The book possibly can be found at many libraries. Charts in the back of the book list the names of the families, where they came from, where and when they settled in Canada and nativity of family before coming to America.

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DELAWARE "Hundreds" PROVIDE STEADY LINK (L.A. Times, Dec. 14, 1986)

A government legacy from Great Britian still in use in Delaware today is the "hundred". Today the hundred is primarily a geographic term denoting location.

Dating from King Edmund I (939-946), a hundred was a unit of English local government between a village and a shire, or county. It is thought that the term denoted a geographical area large enough to provide 100 men in time of war.

It was not until 1880 that lows clerks of district court were required by law to begin maintaining records of birth and death. And although the requirement was there after 1880, it took many years to convince all physicians and parents to comply. Therefore, records in most counties are incomplete until well after 1900.
