An ad for the shoe dealer boasted "The finest up-todate cash shoe store in the state." J. J. Stritzel came to America in 1901 from Austria; his son, Ed stated, "His first goal was to be an American citizen and second to be successful."

Son, John, Jr., was about one year of age when his parents moved to Elma. He now resides in California, having visited Elma in 1984. He had attended Elma schools during their residency here.

Thomas Sullivan Family

Thomas and Bridget Brennan Sullivan were parents of six children: Edward, Thomas H., Patrick and Daniel, Mary Roche and Julia Devereaux.

Thomas H. was born on November 10, 1854, in New York. In 1865, the Sullivan's moved to rural Elma. Thomas married Mary Jane Quillinan, daughter of Charles and Catherine Keefe Quillinan, on July 20, 1881, at St. Cecelia.

Thomas H. and Mary Jane had seven children: Frank, Charles, Catherine (Mrs. Albert Laughlin), Omer (a Jesuit priest), Marie (Mother Sister Marie of St. Francis Borgia), Mrs. James (Clair) Greene, and Mrs. Homer (Charlotte) Edmiston.

The Sullivan families were farmers in the Elma area. They were active in the Immaculate Conception Church at Elma. Mary Jane was a country school teacher near Elma and Thomas, Sr., was a county supervisor in the 1880's.

The farm, which was purchased through a Land Patent from the U.S. Government by Thomas and Mary Jane Sullivan, is now owned by the Thiele family, so it has only had two family owners. Thomas built a barn and for the first year of their marriage and until the birth of their first child, Frank, they lived in the loft of the barn. Meanwhile, Thomas built the house which still stands and where all the other children were born. In the 1960's family visitors could still view the number of nicks on the kitchen door frame put there by Thomas when he measured the growth of Marie each year on her birthday.

In his late 40's, Thomas retired from farming and moved into Elma. Their home, built by a Mr. Klemme, who also built the house across the alley, which for many years was the home of Uncle Tom and Aunt Jo Cashman (terms of endearment as they were not relatives) is now owned by Merle and Leona Jacoby. The Diekmann's lived on the southeast corner, the Dr. Stute's family lived on the southwest corner, the Stack's (the local druggist) were on the northwest corner and the Sullivan house was on the northeast corner—all on Main Street. These homes are all still standing, though all have had extensive remodeling.

Frank Sullivan married Margaret Elgas and they raised their family of twelve children in Elma. Their son, George, was killed in the Pacific Theater in World War II

Charles married Margaret Jacoby. They were parents of ten children and lived in the Elma area.

Catherine married Albert Laughlin. She will be remembered by many as the 5th and 6th grade teacher in the Elma Public School during the years 1925

Severt Thompson was born February 7, 1892, the son of Ole and Elizabeth (Nundahl) Thompson. November 17, 1914, he married Mayme Marik and they lived in the Lourdes area.

Mayme was the daughter of Thomas and Mary (Koudelka) Marik. She was born October 22, 1895.

Severt and Mayme began their married life on the farm, moving into Elma in 1932 where he was employed by the Eclipse Lumber Company until his sudden death May 20, 1949.

Mayme died May 20, 1948, after a long struggle with

multiple sclerosis.

They were the parents of five children: Thomas; Mrs. Francis (Clara) Enright; Leo, who died of lockjaw in 1929; Alice, who died of pneumonia in 1936; and Mrs. Jerome (Mary) Heying.

D. H. Tidgwell

One of the first buildings in Elma was the hardware store. D. H. Tidgwell bought lumber in New Hampton and hauled it to the present site of Elma, prior to the time when the railroad was built. He ran the business very successfully for six years.

In 1892, D. H. married Ida M. Trickle of New Hampton, a teacher. He retired from the hardware trade and turned his attention to the breeding and raising of race horses. In Jim Pittenger's book, *I Remember Elma*, Jim remembered his father, D. H. and Bill Murray racing, but D. H. always came in first.

About 1894 D. H. went into the lumber business and ran the yard until 1900 when he sold to the C. W. Chapman Lumber Company.

The Tidgwell's had three children: Lylah, David and Thelma. The only boy, David, died very young.

Ida painted many pictures. In her early years, she painted with oils, later on with pastels. Many of these pictures grace the homes of people in Elma. Ida had many poems committed to memory. Whatever the occasion, she could quote an appropriate poem.

Ward L. Cook (1896-1976) and Lylah Tidgwell (1897-1964) lived 1½ miles north and 1½ miles west of

Elma. In March, 1937, the farm home burned to the ground. Lylah saved their only child, Bonita (Boni Ihns). Lylah was badly burned. To replace the home, the Congregational Church in Elma was purchased for \$800. It cost \$900 to move it to the farm. Lylah taught school in Elma and some of the surrounding towns for over twenty years.

In 1939, Elsie Kippe came to teach the country school (Afton No. 7). Lylah told her she could stay two weeks while she looked for another place to stay. Somehow she never found another place. Elsie made her home with the Cook's for 25 years. At age 62, Elsie joined the Franciscan Order, after having taught school for 44 years. She still teaches in Sioux City.

Boni married Lyle Ihns and lives in Lime Springs. They had two children, David Ward, and Lulylah Cook Ihns. Boni taught art in Riceville for twenty years. David still continues the tradition of the family and teaches at Gilbert, Arizona.

In 1962, Lylah and Ward gave land to the Howard County Conservation Board for a marsh area, known as Lylahs Marsh. A commemorative tree was planted and dedicated to J. (Ding) Darling, a conservation cartoonist. The tree also marked the two millionth evergreen tree to be planted in Iowa.

Dennis Tierney Family

Johannah (Hannah) Kane was born in approximately 1854 near Aurora, Kane County, Illinois, of Irish immigrant parents. She, her parents, and brothers and sisters moved to a farm southwest of Elma. Her younger brother, Michael Kane, was a long-time resident of Elma.

Johanna (Hannah) Kane married Dennis Tierney and two daughters, Gertrude and Evelyn, were born to the union. They resided on a farm two and one-half miles southwest of Elma., which when it was sold in the 1970's had never had a mortgage on it.

Following the death of Dennis Tierney in the early 1900's, his wife and their two daughters moved to the town of Elma, first living in a two-story house across from what was later the Standard Oil Station on Busti Avenue. They later moved to a house on the west side of Elma where Mrs. Tierney, and later, the Stute's, resided until the late 1960's when the house was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Boyle, Sr.

Gertrude and Evelyn Tierney attended Mount St. Joseph Academy, now Clarke College, in Dubuque, Iowa. Evelyn later graduated from Iowa State Teachers College, Cedar Falls, Iowa, and taught in Skagway, Alaska, and in Pocatello, Idaho. She then moved to New York City, received a Masters Degree from Columbia University and taught the mentally handicapped in the New York school system for a number of years. Evelyn died in the 1970's and is buried in New Jersey, where she had resided for many years.

Gertrude Tierney was born in 1884. She married Frederick N. Stute, D.D.S., in November, 1907. They lived with her mother in the house in West Elma, where Mrs. Tierney died in 1940. Except for periodic visits with her children, Gertrude Tierney Stute lived in her home here until the late 1960's, when she moved to the Kahl Home for the Aged, Davenport, Iowa. She died in February, 1971, at age 86, and was buried in the family plot at Calvary Cemetery, Elma, Iowa.

Dennis Tierney Family

Dennis is the son of Walter and Evelyn (Eiffler) Tierney. His grandparents, Dennis and Nina (O'Neil) Tierney and Louis and Thresa (Bucholz) Eiffler, all settled in the Elma area. Dennis and his brother, Ronald, were raised for many years by Ernest and Thresa Kutzbach.

Dennis married Joyce Swehla, daughter of Jerome and Grace Swehla of Alta Vista, who was born and raised near Alta Vista. They have six children: Brett, Bradley, Nicole, Natalie, Brodie and Brian. Dennis is a machinist at White Farm in Charles City and they live near Charles City.

Arthur's son, Louis, married Nora Hill and they continued to farm the land. To this union was born: Francis, deceased; Mrs. Charles (Ellen) Shatek, deceased:

The farm is still in the family, having been purchased recently from the Howard Watson Estate by Louis' great-granddaughter, Richard and Suzan Gansen, granddaughter of Charles and Ellen Shatek.

John H. Watson

John H. Watson was born March 10, 1853, at Lishus Kyl, New York, the oldest child of George and Rebecca (Bateman) Watson. He moved with his parents, four brothers and a sister to a farm near Alpine, Illinois. The family was very poor and John began to earn his living as a hired hand when he was twelve years old.

In the spring of 1876, John came to Howard County, Iowa. He purchased 80 acres of land from George Burgess near the village of Busti in the southwestern part of the county. His land had a house, but no one had lived in it. It was to this farm that he brought his bride, Emily Sayers of Alpine, Illinois, that fall.

It was lonesome country at that time, no roads, no neighbors, no trains, no mail. There were many frightening things—prairie wolves, rattlesnakes, and prairie fires.

John and Emily became the parents of a daughter, Eliza Ann, known as Lollie.

The nearest store was at Busti, along with a saloon and blacksmith shop. Eventually a church was built—the Union Church—where settlers worshipped together. A stagecoach brought mail to the store on its route through the county. The nearest railroad was at Cresco and grain was hauled there for shipment. Coal and other supplies were brought back in lumber wagons.

John's brothers, Arthur and William, and finally, the father, George, moved to Iowa and settled on farms within two miles of John. Many good times were had by the families as they grew up.

At the turn of the century, John moved the house nearer the road and set out a row of maple trees. The farm was registered as the "Maple Row Farm."

John Watson served his community in many ways. He was a respected citizen, a friend of many and was often asked for his advice. He served as assessor and as trustee of Howard Township; in 1906 and 1908 he was elected Supervisor of the Second District. He ran again in 1918 and served two more terms. He was a charter member of the Methodist Church of Elma, where he served for many years. He was a member of the Masonic Order of Mason's and of the Order of Eastern Star.

Emily Watson died in January, 1906, and John Watson died October, 1929.

Lollie Watson and her husband, Earl Schroeder, lived on the farm until their deaths. Members of their family continue to live on the land and in 1976 it was declared a Century Farm.

Weber Family

John Casper Weber and Mary Ashbrenner were married November 20, 1890. They came to the Elma area in 1905. He died in 1927 and she died in 1949.

Their family was made up of: Carl, Casper, Mrs. Wm. (Mary) Thies, Mrs. John (Grace) Dusheck, Mrs. Robert (Julia) Spaulding, Mrs. Richard (Hattie) Rowley, Loven, and John.

Carl Weber came to this area in 1905 having been born in Des Moines June 1, 1892. He attended Elma schools and owned and operated a blacksmith shop in Elma. He made his home with his sister, Mrs. Mary Thies. He died in February of 1958.

The Diedrich Weers Family

Diedrich Johan Wehrs was born in Prussia on October 5, 1845. He came to the United States in January, 1867, and became a citizen of the United States on April 4, 1871, County of Ramsey, St. Paul, Minnesota. At this time he changed the spelling of his last name from Wehrs to Weers.

Deidrich Weers and Anna Maria Miller were married at Barre Mills, Wisconsin, and came to Howard County to live. They farmed northeast of Maple Leaf. Later they moved into Elma to live in a brick house that Mr. Weers built, located on the corner south of the Elma Methodist Church. This house was taken down in later years and a new modern home was built by new owners.

Diedrich Weers and family were members of the St. Peter Lutheran Church. Mr. Weers was a member of the first council and of the building committee of this church. Mr. and Mrs. Weers were the parents of eight children: William, Mrs. August (Emma) Wolf, Mrs. William (Lillie) Mantz, John, Mrs. Ben (Laura) Schoenfeldt, Mrs. Carl (Clara) Kemp, Mrs. Edward (Mayme) Kruger, and Mrs. Emil (Allene) Ring.

Diedrich and sons, William (Bill) and John, were well known as brick layers and masons. His son-in-law, August F. Wolf, was the carpenter for all their

building throughout the community.

The only three-story building in Elma was built by Diedrich Weers in 1896. The building was located on Busti Avenue. Some years later he removed the third story and used the material when building the Opera

House, which now is the Elma Locker.

The store burned down a few years ago and was replaced by another building.

The fireplace in the Elma Park was built by William Weers, with W.P.A. workers helping him, William

Weers' son, Arthur, also did masonry work.

There are several great grandchildren.

Three grandchildren are deceased—Arthur (Bertha) Weers, Wilbur (Tubby) Weers, and Willis (Johnny) Weers.

As of today, the Weers name is carried on by: Arlyn Diedrich Weers, son of William Carl Weers; Richard Arlyn Weers, son of Arlyn Diedrich Weers; Gerald Allan Weers, son of Richard Arlyn Weers; Braden Cory Weers, son of Gerald Allan Weers; Gary Arlyn Weers, son of Richard Arlyn Weers; and Michael John Weers, son of Willis John Weers.

With the depression and the slump in farm prices, his operations dwindled and in 1932 he closed his plant, later selling the business to George Haberman of Ft. Atkinson. Mr. Whelan continued to operate a produce station, buying for Goodrich and Searcy of Cresco.

John Whelan died February 8, 1934. He is buried at Elma.





The LaVern Worple Family

George Ostrander was born in Pennsylvania in April of 1823. He apprenticed in his father's blacksmith shop at age 10. George built a blacksmith shop in 1860. It was a landmark in the area and was torn down in 1905.
