GLEN W. DOONAN

Glen Walter Doonan, the son of Thomas and Sarah (Alwill) Doonan, was born January 28, 1895, on a farm in Clay Township, Shelby County, Iowa. He died March 22, 1985, at the Baptist Memorial Home in Harlan, Iowa, having attained the age of 90 years, 1 month, and 24 days.

Glen attended country school and grew to adulthood on his parents farm.

On December 12, 1917, Glen was united in marriage to Mary Jensen at her parents farm in Clay Township. One daughter Fern was born to this union.

Mr. and Mrs. Doonan then farmed for a year, and on July 26, 1918, Glen was inducted into the United States Army. He served his country during World War I overseas in France as a private in the 163rd Depot Brigade.

After his Honorable Discharge on February 10, 1919, Glen returned to Shelby County where he farmed in Jackson Township. In 1951, Mr. and Mrs. Doonan retired and moved into Harlan. This has been their home since that time.

Mr. Doonan was a member of the First United Methodist Church and The Helmer Royal Post No. 150 American Legion, both of Harlan for over 50 years.

He was preceded in death by seven brothers Robert, John, Everett, Clarence, Lattimer, Frank, and Arthur; and three sisters Laura, Anna, and Grace.

He is survived by his wife Mary of Harlan; one daughter Fern (Mrs. Raymond) Thomsen of Harlan; 3 grandchildren, and 9 great grandchildren; nieces and nephews; other relatives and many friends.
