John Haller, the son of Louis and Barbara Haller, was born on a farm near Rich Fountain, Mo., on Feb. 25, 1892. He was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic church in Rich Fountain. He attended a country school and grew to adulthood on his parents farm. Mr Haller enlisted in the U.S. Army on July 29, 1918. He served in France during WW I and was honorably

discharged on March 11, 1919.

On Sept. 22, 1925, he was united in marriage to Helen Schwery at St. Mary's Catholic church of Portsmouth. Four children were born to this union. They farmed near Portsmouth until 1955. At that time, they moved to Harlan and Mr Haller worked as a butcher until his retirement in 1965. They continued to make their home in Harlan.
