**HARLAN** — Stella Lansman, daughter of Andrew and Anna Margrethe Jensen Jacobsen, was born on a farm in Monroe twp., Shelby county, Ia., near Walnut on March 17, 1894. As a baby she moved with her parents to Omaha, Nebr., and this was their home until returning to Shelby county, when Stella was a young girl. She attended Harlan high school and later the Iowa State Teacher's College in Cedar Falls. She then taught in Shelby, Cass & Pottawattamie counties for several years. On Dec. 25, 1919, she married Emanuel Lansman at her parent's home in Harlan. Two sons were born to this union. After their marriage, Mr and Mrs Lansman farmed near Fiscus until 1928 when they loved to Jacksonville. They spent four

years there before moving to a farm in Monroe twp. This was their home for 20 years until retiring from the farm in 1953. They moved to Walnut and a year later moved to Harlan which has been their home since that time.

Mrs Lansman died at Myrtue Memorial hospital in Harlan, on July 28, 1978, at 84 years, four months and 11 days.

She was a charter member of the Calvary Baptist church at Walnut and was also a member of the Monroe Sunshine club.

She was preceded in death by her parents and by five brothers - Francis, Chris, Clarence, Harvey, and Sigor Jacobsen. Her survivors include her husband, Emanuel of Harlan; two sons - Robert E. and Harold D. Lansman, both of Harlan, five grandchildren; and one great-grandson, by two sisters - Mabel (Mrs Fred Hansen) and Esther (Mrs Rex Chambers), both of Harlan; nieces and nephews and other relatives.

Funeral services were held at Pauley Funeral Home in Harlan on Monday, July 31, 1978, with Rev. Ted Konvalin, pastor of the First Baptist church in Nebraska City and the Rev. Larry LaVelle, pastor of the First United Methodist church in Harlan, officiating. Burial was in the Harlan cemetery with Alan E. Jahn, David Lansman, Ray M. Swenson, Merlin Sorensen, Donald G. Sorensen, and Gaillard L. Nelson serving as casket-bearers.
