GEORGE SCHNEIDER, 87

Schneider, son of George and Frances Stolz Schneider was born April 2, 1888, in Westphalia. He died April 25, 1975, at Myrtue Memorial hospital, in Harlan, at age 87 years and 23 years. George attended St. Boniface school and grew to adulthood in Westphalia. He was baptized and confirmed in St. Boniface Catholic church and was a lifetime member of St. Boniface church and Holy Name Society. On June 19, 1911, he married Emma Caroline Weihs at St. Boniface Catholic church in Westphalia. To this union seven children were born. After Mr and Mrs Schneider were married they farmed until 1945 at which time they retired and moved into the town of Westphalia. After the death of his wife on Sept. 29, 1964, Mr Schneider continued to make his home in Westphalia until 1972, when he became a resident of Little Flower Haven in Earling. George was a Westphalia Town Council Board Member and for several years he was a Member of the Board of the Westphalia Credit Union.

In addition to his wife, Emma Mr Schneider was preceded in death by his parents; one daughter, Marle; two sisters, Lena Goeser and Therese Schechinger and three grandchildren. George is survived by four daughters - Luella (Mrs Hubert Kloewer) of Defiance, Alvera (Mrs Elmer Nelson) of Coleridge, Nebr., Mildred (Mrs Alfred Bruck) of Dow City, and Irene (Mrs Joseph Leuschen) of Earling, and two sons - Walter and Elmer Schneider, both of Westphalia, by four sisters - Mrs Mary Kaufman, Catherine (Mrs Henry Mum) and Mrs Rose Rueschenberg, of Earling, and Mrs Frances Loehr, of Carroll, 35 grandchildren; 19 great grandchildren; nieces and nephews and other relatives.

A Mass Concelebrated Christian Burial was celebrated on, Monday, April 28, 1975, at St. Boniface Catholic church in Westphalia, with Rev Jacob Weiss as celebrant, and Rev Edward R. Kelly, concelebrant. Burial was in St. Boniface cemetery with Jerome Schneider, Allen Schneider, Daryl Schneider, Tom Leuschen, Bill Bruck and Terry Kurtzhal serving as pallbearers.
