



education trainable class. In 1966, in addition to Shelby County, he also served as County Superintendent of Cass County. He retired June 30, 1975 after 31 years of being the Shelby County Superintendent and 9 years as Cass County Superintendent. He guided Shelby County through The agony of court battle regarding consolidation.

Dec. 22, 1938, he married Lavinia Kathleen North of Vail. They established their family home at 1204 Baldwin St., in 1944. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Christ of Harlan, a 57 year member of the Masonic Lodge, a member of the Lebanon Chapter of Eastern Star, and a member of the Abu Bekr Aider of the Shrine. He was a member of the Shelby County Historical Society and a life member of Iowa State Historical Society, a life member of the National Educational honorary member of Iowa School Administrators.

Upon retirement in 1975, they established a winter home in Venice, FL. He was an associate member of Grace United Methodist Church in Venice. He died at Venice Nursing Papillion South in Venice, FL., Aug. 13, 1990, at age 80 years, 8 months and 8 days.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his sister, Leona (Harry) Maier of Lehigh, and his wife, Lavinia in 1986.
