HARLAN – Bernard Wayne Guyett, son of Lloyd and Lois (Johns) Guyett was born Aug. 16, 1926, on a farm near Woodbine. He attended school in Woodbine, graduating from Woodbine High School in 1944.

In July of 1944, he entered the U.S. Army Air Force serving his country during the WW II in the 8th Air Vehicle Squadron. During this time, he served in the American Theater, European-African Middle East Theater as well as the Army of occupation in Germany. After his Honorary discharge in Nov. of 1946, he returned to the Woodbine area where he worked for area farmers. June 7, 1948, he re-enlisted in the U.S. Army where he served in 7th Infantry during combat in Korea. He received his second Honorable Discharge June 6, 1952.

Feb. 14, 1952, he married Shirley Peterson in Harlan. Two sons were born to this union. They made their home in Harlan where he was employed as a factory representative in the agri-business field. He died Nov. 17, 1992, at the Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital in Co. Bluffs at age 66 years, three months and one day.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church, Helmer Reyelt Post No. 150 American Legion, Shelby County V.F.W. Post No. 941, Parian Lodge No. 321 A.F. and A.M., all of Harlan and the Abu-Bekr Temple Shrine of Sioux City.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by three brothers, Max, Dick and Kenneth and also one step-brother, Keith Travis. He is survived by his wife, Shirley of Harlan; two sons, Bruce of Harlan and Tim of Omaha, NE.; four brothers, Francis of Omaha; Phillip of Morehead; Larry of Woodbine; and Jack, also of Omaha; two sisters, Helen Skop of San Diego, CA., and Dorothy (Mrs Robert) Lohrmann of Manilla; nieces and nephews and other relatives.

Funeral services were held Nov. 20, 1992 at the Pauley Funeral Home in Harlan with Rev. D. Stephen Clinton of First United Methodist Church in Harlan, officiating. Military rites were conducted at the Harlan cemetery by the Helmer Reyelt Post #150 American Legion of Harlan. Serving as casketbearers were Willis Towne, Eric P. Schmidt, Lyle Knudsen, Wayne A.
