She was a member of St. Michael's Catholic Church of Harlan; St. Michael's Guild, Quilting Club; Shelby County Commanders and several card clubs. She also enjoyed playing the slide trombone in the Westridge Kitchen

Band.

In addition to her parents and stepmother, Anna Schulte, she was preceded in death by her husband; three brothers, Lawrence, John and Raymond and two sisters, Cecelia and Ellen. She is survived by a son, Kenneth of Omaha; a daughter, Patricia Nollen of Denison; five grandchildren; three great-grandchildren; two brothers, Howard Schulte of Jefferson and Paul Schulte of Carroll; six sisters, Josephine (Mrs Ray) Kwapiszeski of Panama; Helen (Mrs Ray) Carey of The Dallas, OR.; Alice (Mrs Phil) Carey of Panama; Bernice (Mrs Leo) Feser of Defiance; Theresa (Mrs Cecil) Blum of Walnut and Agnes (Mrs Leo) Gaul of Earling; nieces and nephews and other relatives.
