In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by six brothers, Leonard, Dewey, Dale, Paul, Norman and Elliott and one sister, Marie. He is survived by one sister, Helen Gloeckl of Belton, MO; nieces, nephews and other relatives.

A memorial service was held Dec. 5, 1987 at Pauley Funeral Home in Harlan with Pastor Oliver S. Solberg of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Jacksonville, officiating. Burial was in the Harlan cemetery. Pauley Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.
