

## Ted Hupp, 82

**COON RAPIDS** — Theodore Roosevelt Hupp, son of George and Grace Smith Hupp was born Nov. 23, 1904 near Old Carrollton, Carroll county. He attended country school.

On Nov. 3, 1926, he married Nora Irene Sapp. They farmed near Glidden for several years and then moved to the Coon Rapids area where they farmed for over 50 years. They retired from the farm and made their home in Coon Rapids and later lived in FL, for a short time. They returned to Iowa and resided in Bayard. She died in 1977 and he continued to live in Bayard, making his home there a total of 14 years.

He served as mayor of Coon Rapids from 1961 until 1967. It was during this time that the Thomas Rest Haven was built. He was instrumental in overcoming many of the legal hurdles encountered during the planning and construction of the facility. During WWII, he was honored for his efforts in urging area residents to buy war bonds. His leadership helped Audubon county to be first in filling quotas during several war bond drives. Failing health forced him to be hospitalized this spring. He died at Mercy Medical Center in Des Moines on May 22, 1987 at age 82 years, 5 months and 29 days.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Nora; by three children, Bertha and Lorene as youths and Jim as a young man who died in an auto accident while serving with the US Army in Germany; also by two sisters, Carrie and Mae. He is survived by three children, Marlene Gilliam (Mrs Robert) of Des Moines; Lowell Hupp of Harlan and Lorne Hupp of Audubon; 17 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren; three sisters, Pearl Sapp of Des Moines; Mabel Netsch of Spencer and Lucille Van Lou of Des Moines.

Funeral services were May 26, 1987 at First Christian church, Coon Rapids with Rev. Glenda Dietrich, officiating. Burial was in Westlawn cemetery, Glidden with Gerald Durbin, Ted Hill, Marty Hupp, Ray Hill Jr., Lorne Hupp Jr., Rick Hupp and Teri Monthei serving as casketbearers. Ohde Funeral Home in Manning was in charge of arrangements.
